



## **YEAR IN REVIEW**

# **Equity, Diversity & Inclusion** workshops

This season, Hockey New Brunswick hosted sixteen Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion workshops with over 750 participants attending. The participants included players, coaches, officials, parents, and volunteers.

The focus of the workshops was making our sport more inclusive, how we can accommodate the differences of people and ideas to promote diversity awareness.

### **Neurodiverse Camp**

Hockey New Brunswick partnered with the Autism Resource Centre to offer a neurodiverse hockey program in Dieppe. The program was free of charge and open to all neurodiverse youth between the ages of 5 to 17, a total of 30 participants took part in the Camp that included 10 on-ice sessions.

## **NHL / NHLPA First Shift**

The NHL/NHLPA First Shift program is designed to ensure a positive experience for new-to-hockey families by offering a low-cost entry program to hockey. This season, programs were hosted in:

Fredericton

Central Female

Moncton

Kennebecasis Valley

Restigouche North

**Fundy Female** 

In addition to the above programs, a Para Hockey First Shift program was hosted for the first time in New Brunswick. The participants attended free of charged and received a full set of hockey equipment, sled rental and twelve on-ice sessions.

### March Break Female Skills Camps

Female Skills Development Camps were held during March Break in Edmundston, Florenceville and Miramichi.

The primary focus of the camps was centred around on-ice fundamental skills, with off-ice time scheduled for life skill enhancement in areas such as respect, fitness, and teamwork. Off-ice fitness sessions are included involving games with teamwork and proper stretching. Each of the camps included two on-ice sessions and two off-ice sessions.

## Para Hockey Cup

In April, Hockey Canada announced that the town of Quispamsis, N.B., will host the 2023 Para Hockey Cup, Dec. 3-9. It will be the fourth time the town has hosted a Hockey Canada event.

The Para Hockey Cup is an annual international Para Hockey event that brings four of the strongest Para Hockey teams together for international competition.

#### **Global Girls Game**

The New Brunswick leg of the Hockey Canada Global Girls Game was held February 18th in Dalhousie.

The IIHF Global Girls' Game originated in 2015, a unique event that was created to unite the hockey community by having players from around the globe all playing in the same game.

### **Hockey Canada Assist Fund**

The Hockey Canada Foundation Assist Fund was created in response to the many families experiencing financial challenges. The goal of the Fund is to help Canadian youth access hockey and play the game they love.

The Assist Fund provides up to \$500 per player in registration fee subsidies to approved applicants who are registered with a Hockey Canadasanctioned association.

195 HNB members received funding from the Assist Fund this season, totalling \$86,462 provided to HNB members.

#### **HNB Fundraiser**

The HNB fundraiser is aimed toward keeping the cost of participation in amateur hockey to a minimum, while providing an opportunity for minor hockey associations, teams, and athletes to raise money for their groups. As part of their registration fee, minor hockey players receive 10 tickets which are \$3/each.

For the first time, the World Junior Championships were hosted in New Brunswick as Moncton co-hosted the event with Halifax, NS.

In addition to the exciting action, that was capped with a thrilling overtime win and GOLD medal by Team Canada, it provided an excellent opportunity for HNB members to participate in development initiatives prior to the event.

Development initiatives leading into the event included:

- 8 player camps on December 17th / 18th led by Hockey Canada instructors. A total of 240 players attending the on-ice sessions.
- 4 coach clinics on December 17th / 18th led by Hockey Canada instructors. A total of 70 coaches attended.

A Dreams Come True Camp was held in Moncton that 30 local players attended. Dreams Come True is a financial assistance program that brings hockey into the lives of children who might otherwise never get the opportunity to play. The program subsidizes registration fees and provides head-to-toe equipment.

## World Junior 50/50 Legacy

The World Juniors 50/50 proceeds left a legacy of \$158,000 that supports equity, diversity and inclusion initiatives, female hockey, and safety.

#### Female Hockey Associations - \$88,000

A grant application has been created, that associations and leagues can apply for. The grants are designed to strengthen female hockey programming, with a particular focus on three areas: Athlete Experience, Leadership and Promotion. The primary objective is to achieve growth in the female game at every age group and level of play for players, coaches, and support staff.

#### **Equity, Diversity & Inclusion initiatives - \$40,000**

There are three areas specific to Equity, Diversity & Inclusion that will receive funding:

- Neurodiverse Camps: This season, Hockey
  New Brunswick is hosting a Neurodiverse
  program for all neurodiverse youth between
  the ages of 5-17 in Dieppe. The program is free
  of charge and includes 10 on-ice sessions. Next
  season, Hockey New Brunswick will host three
  programs; an application for associations to
  host one of the three programs will be sent out
  this summer.
- Equity, Diversity & Inclusion workshops: Minor Hockey Associations can apply to host Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion workshops. The focus of the workshops is making hockey more inclusive, how we can accommodate the differences of people and ideas to promote diversity awareness.
- Para Hockey Programming: Funding to existing para hockey programs to assist with coach development and recruitment initiatives.

#### Sexual Violence New Brunswick - \$30,000

To support Sexual Violence New Brunswick's professional development, training, and public education programs. As well as to support their counselling programs for those affected by Sexual Violence.


## **FINANCES**



## **HOCKEY CANADA - INDEPENDENT THIRD PARTY**

Hockey Canada has established a new, fully independent, and confidential reporting mechanism for all individuals regarding any incidents involving Hockey Canada sanctioned programming. This reporting mechanism is known as the Independent Third Party. The Independent Third Party (ITP) is led by experienced, diverse professionals.

All hockey-related complaints including maltreatment, sexual violence, harassment, abuse, or discrimination will be assessed by the ITP, which will determine the proper jurisdiction and, where applicable, retain investigators and dispute resolution panels who are also independent of Hockey Canada.

The below report presents data for all levels on the number of complaints, types of complaints, and general complaint statistics.


Complaints which were not accepted by Hockey Canada's Independent Third Party were referred to Hockey New Brunswick's Discipline and Complaints Policy for further action.



Discriminatory grounds include the following, without limitation:


- Race, national or ethnic origin, skin colour, or language spoken;


