HIGH PERFORMANCE PROGRAM

The 2025-26 high performance cycle saw our spring camps feature over 300 of the top players in the province at 4 divisions, Male U14, U15 and Female U14, U16.

The University of New Brunswick is home to our summer development camps which featured 80 female players across the U14 and U16 divisions.



ATLANTIC CHALLENGE CUP / QMJHL CUP RECAP

The male summer camps saw 148 players across three divisions (U14/U15/U16). These camps serve as the final evaluation for our provincial teams who compete at the QMJHL cup and Atlantic Challenge Cup.

This past October featured the 4th annual QMJHL Cup in Atlantic Canada for Under 16 Male players who are eligible for the QMJHL Draft in 2026 and the 28th Annual Atlantic Challenge Cup. Both Events were hosted by Hockey New Brunswick, the QMJHL Cup in Dieppe and the Atlantic Challenge Cup in Moncton.

The results of the Atlantic Challenge Cup and QMJHL Cup are displayed below along with past participants who have gone on to represent New Brunswick on Canadian National teams this season.

YEAR IN REVIEW



Educational Offerings

Hockey New Brunswick continued to prioritize education and awareness initiatives throughout the 2025–2026 season, delivering a range of impactful sessions focused on inclusion, respect, and responsible conduct.

Normand Hector led five Equity, Diversity and Inclusion workshops across the province, engaging more than 250 participants. These sessions focused on fostering inclusive environments, increasing awareness, and promoting respectful behaviour within the hockey community.

Brock McGillis delivered the Shiftmaker's Tour workshops in Fredericton, Quispamsis, Moncton, and Shediac. The initiative reached over 25 teams and more than 575 participants, providing powerful, experience-based learning focused on inclusion, culture change, and creating safe spaces in sport.

In addition, Allison Forsyth presented to Hockey New Brunswick members on social media conduct, with 75 participants attending. This session emphasized responsible online behaviour, digital citizenship, and the importance of upholding Hockey New Brunswick values both on and off the ice.

Collectively, these educational offerings reflect Hockey New Brunswick's ongoing commitment to building a safe, inclusive, and respectful hockey environment for all participants.

Skate Your Way Program

Hockey New Brunswick ran the Skate Your Way, formally known as the Neurodiverse hockey program in Dieppe, Quispamsis, Fredericton and Miramichi this season. The program was free of charge and open to all neurodiverse youth between the ages of 5 to 18, a total of 118 participants took part in the sessions that included 10 on-ice sessions.

For the second time, Dieppe was the host of the Skate Your Way year end jamboree. This event was in collaboration with Hockey Canada and the Esso Cup during the event in late April. Players attended an on-ice session and enjoyed refreshments before concluding the season.



NHL / NHLPA First Shift

The NHL/NHLPA First Shift program is designed to ensure a positive experience for new-to-hockey families by offering a low-cost entry program to hockey. This season, programs were hosted in:

Skills Camps

Co-ed skills camps were hosted in Bathurst, Dalhousie, Dieppe, Edmundston, Grand Bay, Grand Falls, Hampton, Hartland, Miramichi, Moncton, Oromocto, Quispamsis, Richibucto, Sackville, St. Stephen and Sunny Corner.

The primary focus of the camps was centred around on-ice fundamental skills, with off-ice time scheduled for life skill enhancement in areas such as respect, fitness, and teamwork. Off-ice fitness sessions are included involving games with teamwork and proper stretching. Each of the camps included two on-ice sessions and two off-ice sessions.

YEAR IN REVIEW



Esso Fun Days

Esso Fun Days are a celebration of the joy of hockey for young girls and women across the country. These events provide a platform for women and girls to engage with the sport in a fun and inclusive environment. The free-to-attend events, hosted by various associations, included days filled with exciting activities, skill-building drills, scrimmages, and plenty of laughter and smiles on the ice. Hockey New Brunswick's dedicated members proudly hosted 10 out of the 50 Esso Fun Day events nationwide, showcasing their commitment to fostering the love of the game in local communities. The enthusiastic and passionate hosts ensured that each event was a memorable experience for all participants, leaving a lasting impact on the young hockey players who took part.

Esso Cup

The Moncton Rockets hosted the ESSO Cup April 19th-25th at the UNIPlex in Dieppe. It marked the first time that the ESSO Cup was held in New Brunswick.

The Rockets lost 3-0 in the Bronze Medal game to the Northern Subways (NS).

In conjunction with the event, several development initiatives were held, including Esso Fun Days, skills camps, a goalie camp, a We Are Coaches certification clinic, and an officiating clinic.



Hockey Canada Assist Fund

The Hockey Canada Foundation Assist Fund was created in response to the many families experiencing financial challenges. The goal of the Fund is to help Canadian youth access hockey and play the game they love.

The Assist Fund provides up to \$500 per player in registration fee subsidies to approved applicants who are registered with a Hockey Canada-sanctioned association.

81 HNB members received funding from the Assist Fund this season, totalling \$46,866 provided to HNB members.

Spordle Play

During the 2025–2026 season, Hockey New Brunswick continued to advance its digital modernization through the expansion of the Spordle Play initiative. This platform provided a centralized website, access to the Spordle mobile app, and electronic game scoring, enhancing the overall experience for players, coaches, officials, and fans. Participating leagues included the U13 AAA League, Female Provincial League, and District 1 & 2 League, all of which benefited from real-time scoring, streamlined scheduling, and improved data accuracy. In addition, several associations utilized the platform to support tournament operations, while Spordle Play served as the official scoring and information hub for all Minor, Female, and AAA Provincial Championships. Building on the success and positive feedback from this season, Hockey New Brunswick is planning to further expand the use of Spordle Play across additional leagues and events in the coming year.



Goaltending Specialty Clinics

This past year HNB expanded on its delivery of its goaltending specialty clinics. The delivery of goaltending 1 involves an online delivery and an on-ice portion. This year HNB delivered 2 clinics totaling 45 coaches trained and the goaltending 1 level. The Goaltending level 2 program will return during the 2026-2027 season

YEAR IN REVIEW



High Performance Goalie Clinic

In July of 2025 HNB ran its 2nd high performance goaltending clinic, which was offered to male and female goalies born in the year 2013. Goalies who competed at a competitive U13 level (AAA, AA and A) in their first year of U13 eligibility were invited and 18 accepted the invitation to participate at the annual camp.

The camp ran over the course of 3 days, with 5 on-ice sessions, sessions on proper warm up and cool down techniques and off-ice presentations. The presentations focused on player development and players pathways. They were delivered by High Performance Director, Brogan Bailey, Saint John Sea Dogs Goalie Coach, Kyle MacDonald and New Jersey Devils Goaltender, Jake Allen.

Sponsorship and Partnerships

Hockey New Brunswick was pleased to welcome two new partners during the 2025–2026 season, further strengthening support for programming and member opportunities across the province.

Dairy Farmers of New Brunswick joined as the presenting sponsor of the Hockey New Brunswick Minor and Female Provincial Championships. Their support enhanced the overall championship experience and contributed to the continued success and profile of these key events on the provincial calendar.

Hockey New Brunswick also partnered with Falavory, a New Brunswick-based gourmet soup and seasonal blends organization, to provide teams with an additional fundraising opportunity. This initiative offered accessible and effective options for teams to raise funds, helping to reduce financial barriers and support participation across all levels of the game.

These new partnerships reflect Hockey New Brunswick's commitment to collaborating with organizations that support the growth and sustainability of hockey within the province.

HNB Fundraiser

The HNB fundraiser is aimed toward keeping the cost of participation in amateur hockey to a minimum, while providing an opportunity for minor hockey associations, teams, and athletes to raise money for their groups. As part of their registration fee, minor hockey players receive 10 tickets which are \$5/each.

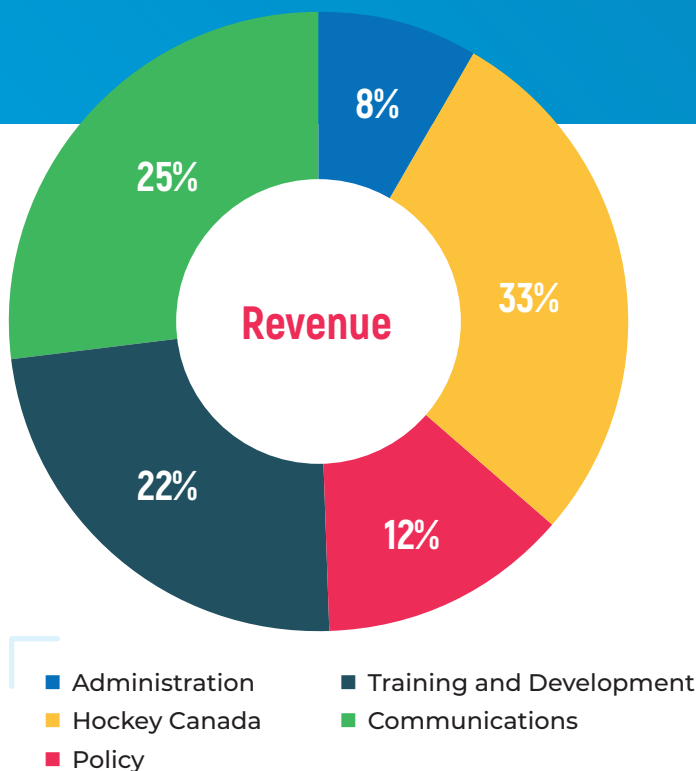

HNB finances its operations primarily through participant fees, government and non-governmental funding, and programming.

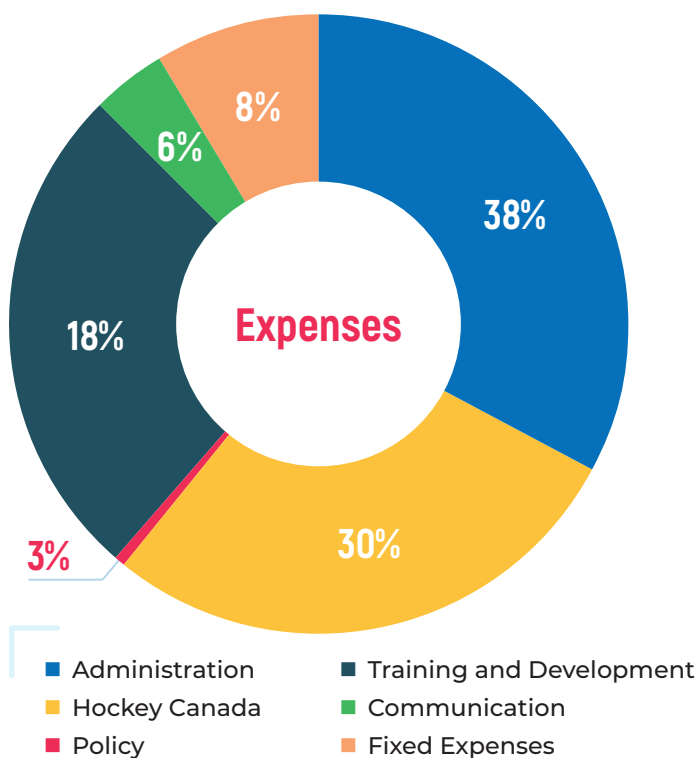
The following figures set out HNB's incoming revenues by source, and its expenses by type.

HOCKEY CANADA INDEPENDENT THIRD PARTY

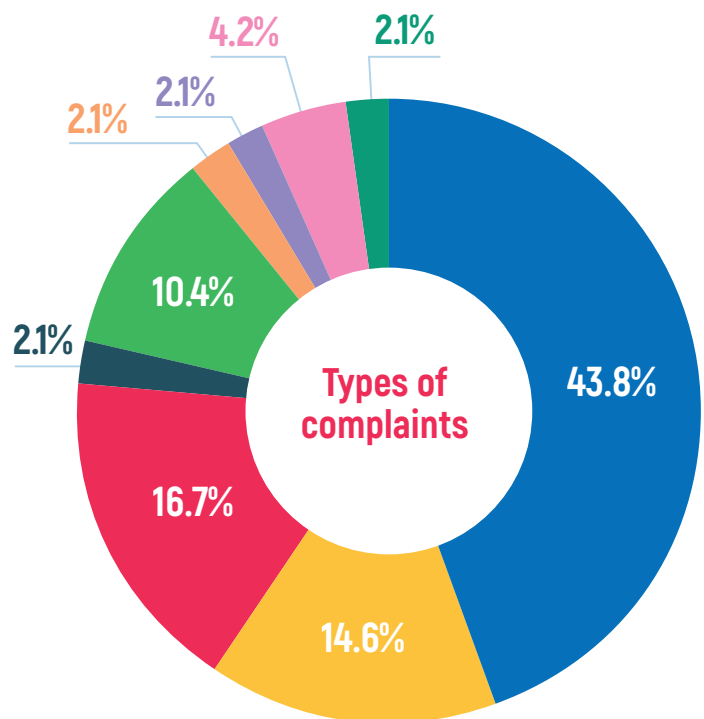


Hockey Canada has established a fully independent, and confidential reporting mechanism for all individuals regarding any incidents involving Hockey Canada sanctioned programming. This reporting mechanism is known as the Independent Third Party. The Independent Third Party (ITP) is led by experienced, diverse professionals.

All hockey-related complaints including maltreatment, sexual violence, harassment, abuse, or discrimination will be assessed by the ITP, which will determine the proper jurisdiction and, where applicable, retain investigators and dispute resolution panels who are also independent of Hockey Canada.

The below report presents data for all levels on the number of complaints, types of complaints, and general complaint statistics.

Complaints which were not accepted by Hockey Canada's Independent Third Party were referred to Hockey New Brunswick's Discipline and Complaints Policy for further action.

DISCRIMINATION ALLEGATIONS

All discrimination allegations (Hockey Canada Rule 11.4) are investigated by Hockey New Brunswick.

Discriminatory grounds include the following, without limitation:

- Race, national or ethnic origin, skin colour, or language spoken;
- Religion, faith or beliefs;
- Age;
- Sex, sexual orientation or gender identity / expression.
- Marital or familial status;
- Genetic characteristics;
- Disability



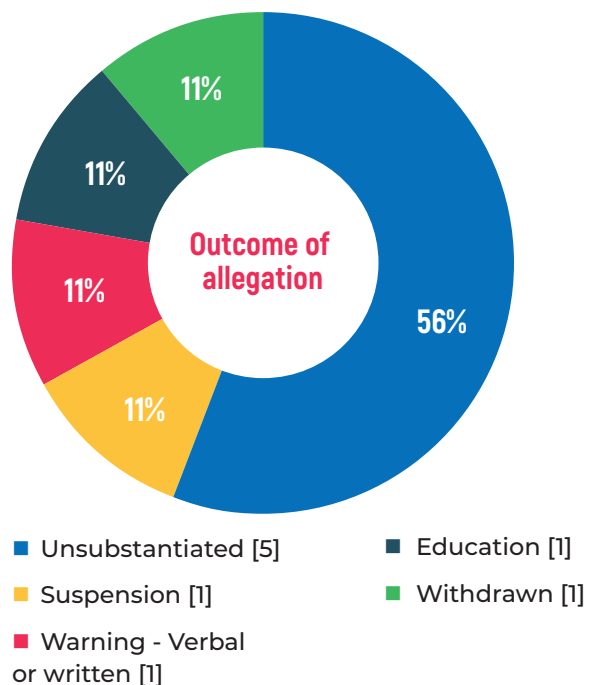
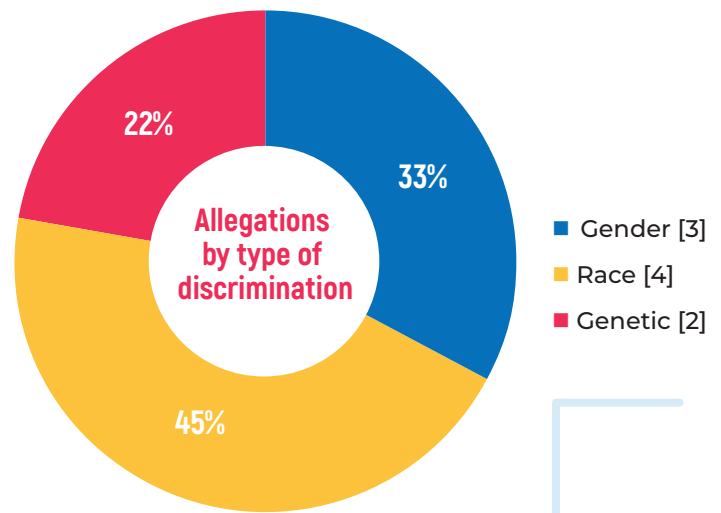
NEXT STEPS

UNB SPORT LAW CLINIC

Hockey New Brunswick has partnered with the University of New Brunswick law program.

As part of our collaboration with the UNB Sport Law Clinic, students are engaged as independent third-party investigators to conduct investigations into complaints, ensuring impartiality and professionalism in the process. The course itself provides specialized experiential learning that allows for in-depth training on the legal and ethical issues surrounding sport governance, misconduct, and dispute resolution. Working in collaboration with sports administrators, coaches, and athletes, the Clinic's students develop an understanding of the legal frameworks and mechanisms of sport law as well as practical skills for the provision of legal advice to sport organizations.

Students from the Sport Law Clinic investigated discrimination allegations as well as Code of Conduct complaints on behalf of Hockey New Brunswick.

On February 20th, the UNB Sport Law Clinic hosted a symposium featuring presentations on a range of important topics, including: Team Fundraising & Accounting; Liability Waivers; Youth Concussion Management; International Sport Law; Why do Young Officials Quit; The Responsible Coaching Movement; and Video Review Policies.

HNB VIDEO REVIEW POLICY

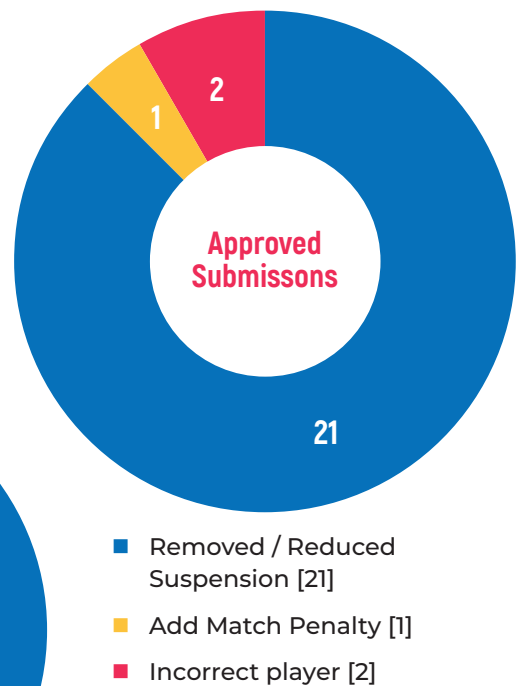
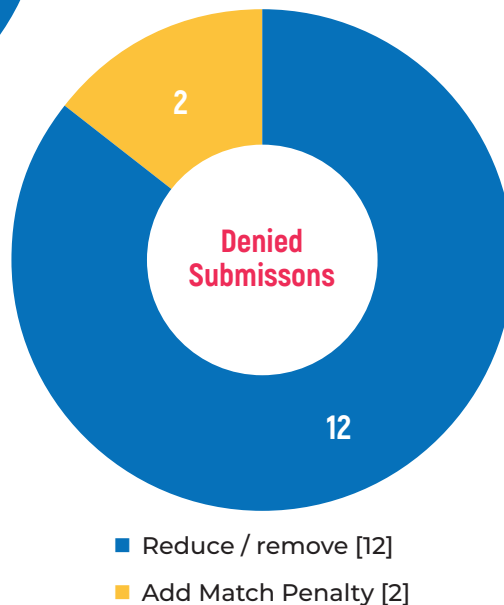
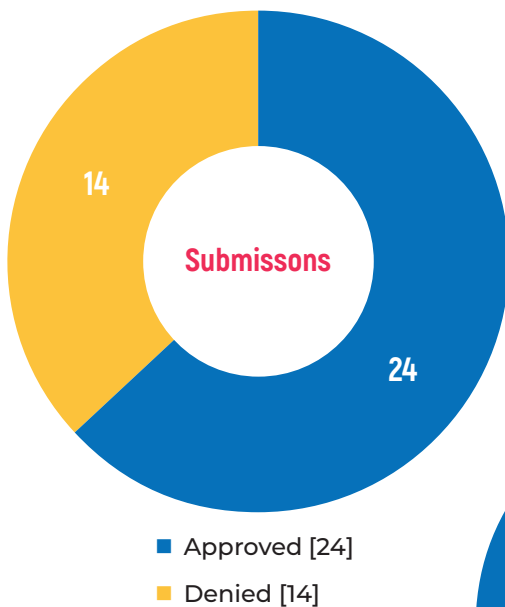
Hockey New Brunswick acknowledges that video evidence may possibly support the decision makers, and as such, may consider it in the decision-making process, where approved and at its discretion.

The policy outlines specific criteria for accepting video submissions. The policy applied to Minor Hockey programs, with the exception of leagues that have approved video review policies.

Submissions were required to fall under one (1) or more of the following criteria:

- i. Videos for the purpose of identifying the correct player in situations where an incorrect player may have been identified by the on-ice official(s) and issued a penalty resulting in suspension. This excludes players who have been issued a penalty without a suspension.
- ii. Videos for the purpose of reviewing the conduct of game officials, players, or coaches during altercations, specifically when the use of force is concerned.
- iii. Videos for the purpose of reviewing a game situation that has, or may have, resulted in a serious injury to any player whether a penalty was assessed or not, where it's determined that a match penalty should have been assessed.
- iv. Videos for the purpose of reviewing a penalty that carries a suspension of 3 or more games.
- v. Videos for the purpose of reviewing the conduct of spectators or parents.

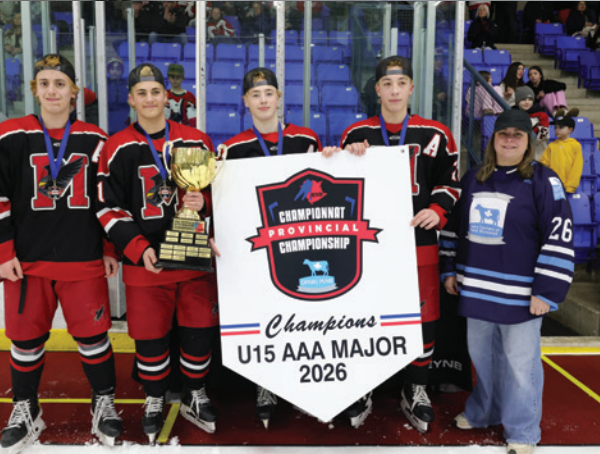
